# **5oth Anniversary Gloom at The Met**

Elsewhere in this edition of DO News, we mention Glyndebourne's target of 90% seat capacity to enable them to balance their annual budget. Well spare a thought for the 'poor' Metropolitan Opera in New York. Speculation has long been rife that *Live from The Met* broadcasts are doing the company no good whatsoever. New York's operagoers are choosing to watch performances in their local cinema at a fraction of the cost of one of the 4,000 seats in the famous auditorium. Analysis of box office performance for the current season, which is about to come to a close, shows that The Met averaged a dismal 67% of potential capacity to date. That's just 1% up on the 2015-16 all-time low.

When The Met moved to the Lincoln Center in 1966/7, Sir Rudolf Bing - the company's general manager at the time - famously 'complained' that they had so many subscribers, it was almost "impossible to ever buy a single ticket" from the box office!


Today's general manager, Peter Gelb, believes they are witnessing a decline in the subscription model - which was originally formulated by marketing guru, Danny Newman, for the Lyric Opera Chicago in the late 70s. The subscription series involves offering a discount to audience-goers who buy an up-front package of tickets for several performances. Most larger companies operate such a system nowadays.

Meanwhile, the five hour gala (followed by dinner) celebrating The Met's 50th anniversary at Lincoln Center on 7 May, raised an impressive \$8 million: a drop in the ocean for a company with an annual budget close to \$300 million.

### Simon Mechlinski

Raimbaud in Le Comte Ory

We welcome Simon Mechlinski, another UK debutant this year. He is amazingly young, but has a stunning velvet-smooth baritone voice. Suffice it to say, she is in such constant demand everywhere that we at the Dorset Opera Festival consider ourselves extremely lucky to have caught a window in her frantic schedule. You will be hearing a lot more of Jennifer France in years to come - and you will adore her as La Comtesse Adèle. Her star is very much in the ascendancy.



### Alejandro del Cerro

Faust in Faus

Alejandro makes his UK debut singing the title role in Faust. He has previously sung the role in Oviedo (where Mark S Doss has also sung Méphistophélès) but they didn't appear in the same performances! He has performed Arturo in Lucia di Lammermoor in Pamplona; debuted in the Teatro de la Zarzuela in La Tempranica under the baton of Rafael Frühbeck de Burgos; The Legend of Kiss, The Guest of Sevillano and Katiuska in Las Palmas de Gran Canaria; Malcolm in Macbeth in Córdoba and he has recently sung in Verdi's opera I vespri siciliani at the Teatro Real, Madrid.



### **Nico Darmanin**

Comte Ory in *Le Comte Ory* 

The young Maltese tenor is fast establishing himself in the bel canto repertoire and the title role in *Le Comte Ory* will be right up his street. He made his Royal Opera House debut as Daniéli in Verdi's *Les vêpres siciliennes* and returned as Apparition of a Youth in Richard Strauss's *Die Frau ohne Schatten*. He also had successful debuts with Scottish Opera (Ramiro *La Cenerentola*), with Welsh National Opera (Almaviva *Il barbiere di Siviglia*) and for De Vlaamse Opera, Antwerp (The Italian Tenor *Der Rosenkavalier*) and has recently been singing Don Ottavio in *Don Giovanni* at the Nederlandse Reisopera.


He is a revered chairman of governors at Thomas Hardye School in Dorchester - the largest school in Dorset with the biggest integrated sixth form in the UK.

## **Celebrity Haven**

The weather for our 2017 Celebrity Lunch at the Harbour Heights Hotel in April, could not have been better.

Glyndebourne's Executive Chairman, Gus Christie, was our very warm and relaxed guest, and 83 Dorset Opera supporters were fascinated by his anecdotes about the world's first and most famous opera festival of which he took charge in 2000.

Gus is the third Christie to head the organisation started by his grandfather in 1934. He told us a great deal about the workings of today's company which, this year, has a budget exceeding £27 million.

It is astonishing to learn that their finely tuned budget requires ticket sales to exceed 90%, and that mounting two 'new' works in a season (*Hipermestra* and *Hamlet*) is of slight concern to him. In the past, one new work was more than enough!

On the question of the new Grange Park Opera, at West Horsley Place in Surrey, Gus is unconcerned by the extra competition. He says: "It's no bad thing. Glyndebourne was the first country house opera. Many have sprung up since, and that's a form of flattery!"

# **Dorset Opera Outreach**Faust given new life by Dorset Pupils



Through the generous philanthropy of Patrons John and Margrette Jones, the Dorset Opera Festival and Queen Elizabeth's School, Wimborne were able to team up in a 5-day Opera Outreach residency involving 45 talented students.

DOF Outreach aims to give young people an introduction to opera, to bring it alive and make it relevant to them in the 21st century. Having taken *Faust* as their theme, the students deconstructed the opera, created new lyrics, composed new music, and performed some sections from Gounod's score, in the original French. Pupils will be given exclusive access to our dress rehearsals in July.

The participants were put through their paces by pianist, presenter and composer Dominic Harlan, opera singer and animateur Lynsey Docherty, with cellist and baritone Matthew Sharp - all leaders in their field.



The resultant performance at the end of the 5-day residency was a world premiere based on the themes of *Faust* - disillusionment, desire, temptation, love and the idea of good eventually triumphing over evil. Their work was staged with spellbinding choreography, complete with an 8-piece band, which enabled talent to shine from students who might never have had such an opportunity before.

Lynsey, who is on the board of Dorset Opera, said of the project, 'Creating opera with young people allows them to develop skills they never knew they had. It is abundantly clear from the resulting piece how the arts stimulate and encourage creativity, communication, cooperation, confidence and self-expression that are vital for young people as they develop into adulthood. Creating their own work validates their ideas, and giving them a glimpse into the world of opera, how singers create sound and the professional and focussed work behind staging such an art form has been revolutionary for the students.'

Steve Glover, Director of Music at Queen Elizabeth's School said, 'I'm so very proud of our students, their intense creativity and commitment to the project, and I was genuinely gobsmacked by both the amount and quality of the resulting performance. They've all learned so much from Lynsey, Dominic and Matthew, and everyone here is absolutely delighted with the outcome.'

DOF Artistic Director Roderick Kennedy stated, 'We were stunned with what these young people were able to achieve in just 5 days of intensive work. A most exciting and fulfilling project. I look forward to the possibility of taking our Opera Outreach programme into other schools around the county - and to having QE pupils join us for our dress rehearsals at Bryanston in July. Our ongoing task is to entice some of them to join the chorus of the 2018 Festival.'

### FODO raises its grant...

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# Ensure your visit to the Dorset Opera Festival goes smoothly

**Bryanston:** For SatNav purposes the postcode is DT11 oPX. The Bryanston campus is private, but it will be open to the public from 17.00 on performance days (12.30 for the Saturday matinee.) You and your guests are most welcome to wander round the glorious grounds.

**Start & Running Times:** Evening performances will start at 19.00. The Saturday matinee starts at 14.00. Performances will be approximately 185 minutes long. This includes the dinner interval of 45-50 minutes. Saturday performances: We would respectfully ask Saturday matinee audience-goers to leave the campus shortly after the performance in order to make way for evening patrons.

The Marquee Bar: will be sited inside the marquee on the lawns not far from the car park and will be selling alcoholic and non-alcoholic drinks including champagne by Pol Roger, wines, teas and coffee. The bar will be open from 17.00 for evening performances and from 12.30 for the matinee. If you have ordered a Dorset Opera picnic or afternoon tea please collect these from the marquee bar. To avoid misunderstandings you will need to present the appropriate catering ticket.

Picnicking: Many Dorset Opera-goers now bring picnics to eat before the performance or during the interval. In the twilight, Bryanston's lawns look resplendent dotted with tables sporting glittering lights and in some cases, candelabra!
